



The Universal Camera





The Universal Camera is a modified English pattern, and is very compact, the 5 x 8 being but 2% inches thick when folded and weighing but 5 pounds. It has extra long bellows, the 5 x 8 having a focal capacity of 19 inches and other sizes in proportion; this allows the use of lenses of extreme length of focus, while lenses of the shortest focus can also be used; owing to the length of bellows the camera can be used for copying if desired, and in fact is as near a *universal* camera as can well be made. It has reversible back with spring-acting ground-glass frame, by which the plate-holder is inserted between the ground-glass and camera-back. The camera is made with both single and


double swing, has rising and falling front controlled by a spring acting in a ratchet, doing away with milled heads; the forward end of bellows is attached to the front and slides with it, thus avoiding a possibility of cutting off the rays of light. The camera-box is made of selected mahogany, highly polished, with all metal work of brass, polished and lacquered.

While very compact, the Universal is very simple of manipulation, there being no loose screws or parts, and is set up by tightening four milled heads and is folded by loosening the same number. It is provided with a leather handle, so that it may be carried without the case if desired, as one holder can be carried between the ground-glass and camera-back. Eastman's Interchangeable View Camera

Reversible Back



In the Eastman Camera lightness, rigidity, strength, compactness, and fine finish are combined in an unusual degree. The front is provided with two means for raising the lens, a movable front board of the usual construction, and an adjustable front, by means of which the whole front of the camera carrying the bellows can be raised and lowered at will, giving *double* the usual range of adjustment.






The focusing is achieved by the front of the camera and lens moving forward by a fine rack-and-pinion movement. By this method of construction and the reversible back, the slide from the plate-holder can be drawn to the right or left when in a horizontal position, or when changed to a vertical position can be drawn upward or downward. The reversing of the back (to enable the operator to make upright views) is accomplished by simply pressing a spring and changing the adjuster carrying the holder from vertical to horizontal. Lenses




Note:—The lenses fitted to the cheaper cameras are what are termed single achromatic—that is, two separate lenses of different curvatures are cemented together with transparent balsam in such a way that the defects of one are partly corrected by the opposite defects of the other. These do very well for landscapes. For taking portraits and pictures of buildings or objects having many straight lines, a double combination of lenses is necessary to make the lines of the picture as straight and uniform as the original. Such a combination also permits using a larger diaphragm or hole of light in proportion to the size of the lens than the single achromatic, and consequently requires shorter exposure. It is, therefore, called "rapid rectilinear." Various persons claim priority in calculating the formula for this combination. All the makers use nearly the same formula—some with slight modifications. The formula being the same, the difference in lenses is in the makers' skill in producing exactly the curves and density of the glass indicated by the formula and in fine polishing and setting.







Plate-Holders

The Perfection Double Plate-holder is very simple and effective. To load the Perfection holder, the end of the plate is rested against the spring-bar at the end of the holder, when by simply pressing the spring-bar with the thumb the plate falls into place. 

Extra Reels enable the operator to remove the exposed paper from the roll-holder without separating the exposures or rewinding the paper film, an operation that should always be avoided. Enough extra reels should be provided to carry all exposures that are intended to be made before developing. For instance, if 100 exposures are to be made on a trip, 3 extra reels are required. Each reel, as soon as full is removed from the holder and replaced by another to take the paper from a fresh spool. The boxes in which the spools are sold serve to store the reels of exposed paper. Empty spools are thrown away.
