




















"A" is the Bromide print. "B" is the pigment paper, which after immersion in chemical solutions is laid down on the Bromide print ("C") squeegeed and placed between greaseproof paper for 15 minutes. At the expiration of that time, the Pigment paper is stripped off the Bromide print ("D") and squeegeed into contact with a sheet of Support paper ("E"). The adhering papers are placed between dry blotting paper for about 20 minutes and then immersed in warm water of about 95° Fahr. As soon as the gelatine begins to ooze from the edges, the pigment paper is stripped from the Support paper ("F") leaving a dark mass of pigmented gelatine on the Support paper ("G") in which the photograph is just visible. The print is gently splashed with warm water until development is complete ("H").

The Bromide print should be placed in cold water after operation "D," thoroughly washed and afterwards re-developed with the usual bromide developer to be ready for the next Carbro to be made from if



If a correct exposure is given to the clouds, then the landscape is badly under-exposed; if the correct exposure is given to the landscape, then the clouds are literally burnt up from over-exposure, and no matter how contrasty they may have appeared to the eye, an unscreened photograph

shows only a blank white sky.

The Royal Foreground Ray Screen is also very useful for subjects which are more strongly illuminated on one side than on the other, as in photographing by the light of a side window or in a narrow street. By simply turning the dark side of the foreground screen toward the bright side of the object a good, even exposure will result.
